

Visiting the Park





A History of **Peace**

In 1928, forward-thinking individuals had a vision of a formal garden on the U.S. and Canada border where peace could be celebrated. In 1932, more than 50,000 people gathered on the prairie to dedicate this sacred space. For over 90 years, the Peace Garden has been a symbol of peace and cooperation among nations. It is a living monument that provides insight to the past that can be seen as you enter the Garden.



World Class Conservatory

Our newly expanded Conservatory is home to approximately 4,000 unique species and cultivars of cacti and succulents from around the world. The plants display an ever-changing variety of texture and colors, and begin to show their floral blooms in February with peak blooms in May and June. This collection was gifted to the Peace Garden in 2009 by Don Vitko of Minot. ND.

The Conservatory serves as a library for protected plants that could someday be extinct. The vast collection of the conservatory with plants from across the world demonstrates how lines in the dirt are not drawn by nature. The work our Horticulturists do ensures the collection thrives for generations.





A Year-Round **Destination**

Hiking and biking trails connect acres of pristine prairie and wilderness, sprinkled with picturesque lakes and ponds. Take a break at one of our picnic grounds or stay the weekend in our summer campground. In winter, bring your skis and snowshoes and stay in one of our winter cabins.



Iconic Formal Garden

With more than 80,000 blooming annuals and perennials, the Formal Garden is home to a variety of installations including a pollinator garden, terraces, fountains, and sculptures that delight visitors. Each year the horticulturists create a specific design theme. Be sure to see the Floral Clock, Sunken Garden, 9/11 Memorial Site, Floral Flags, and Peace Chapel.



Children's Nature Play Park

The Children's Nature Play Park is family-friendly destination. Distinct animal habitat play zones are nestled into an existing forest grove for fun and imaginative play while teaching about the animals, plants, history and Indigenous cultures of the Turtle Mountains through a storytelling approach. Children will enjoy the climbing nets in the turtle area; bridges, dams and lodges in the beaver zone; and a wolf-themed gathering circle with a fire ring at its center.

Camping and Cabins

Spacious and easy access campsites are tucked into the Peace Garden's private, wooded campground with electrical, water, fire rings and picnic tables. Rent a cozy three or four bedroom cabin and explore our fall and winter trails with hiking and cross-country skiing.



One-of-a-Kind Events

Our formal spaces and meeting rooms offer a variety of unique spaces that are perfect for weddings, anniversaries, family reunions, corporate events, and more. Host your function at the Peace Garden for a one-of-a-kind event.



Educational Programming

Cultural venues located within the Peace Garden include the International Music Camp and the North American Game Warden Museum. Special recreation events, family events, and customized educational programming for school field trips and groups visiting the garden are offered

throughout the summer and fall, which may include Cacti and Succulent Collection and Historical tours, North American Game Warden Museum activities, hiking, mindfulness, visiting our pollinator and kitchen garden, and Project WET activities.




Centennial Vision 1932 - 2032

- 6 Children's Nature Play Park Distinct animal habitat play zones nestled into an existing forest grove
- Conservatory & Interpretive Centre Thousands of succulents and cacti, restaurant, gift shop and historical and art exhibits; available for rentals
